Follow the Child's Lead in Conversations

Following the child's lead means *letting* the child lead. And letting the child lead means waiting for up to 3-4 seconds to give the child a chance to start a conversation. They may start the conversation with a sound, a point, or by telling you something. Then, you can follow their lead and say something in response, making sure it is related to the child's interests. Here are some fun things to try:

Play Time

When in doubt, don't hesitate to imitate. For example, if a child is pushing a car across the floor, get your own car and follow their lead by pushing it across the floor too while you make a comment like, "My car is going fast too!" If the child makes a sound (e.g., "vroom"), make that sound too.



While drawing with a child, wait for them to tell you something about what they are drawing. Then follow their lead by making an enthusiastic comment, followed by an openended question. For example, if they say, "I drew a snake," you can reply with, "Wow, what a long snake! Where does your snake live?"





On the Go

While on a walk, wait for the child to notice something and give them a chance to say something about it. Then follow their lead and make a thought-provoking comment about it. For example, if a child points out a flock of birds, respond with, "That's' a lot of birds! I wonder why those birds stay together in a big group instead of flying alone."

Book Reading

While sharing a book, don't worry about reading it from start to finish. If a child decides to turn back to a previous page, go with the flow and make an enthusiastic comment about whatever the child finds interesting. You might say, "There's the gorilla again! He's eating a banana. Yummy!"
